Fearless Christians

Over the years the Catholic Church has laid itself bare to criticism. Sometimes this criticism is underserved, but sadly at other times it is. At certain times in history the Church has been guilty of making mistakes, and doubtless it will continue to make mistakes in the future because we are all human. There are those who complain that the Church is out of step with an increasingly secular world. There are even those who point to diminishing Mass attendances and predict that the Church is living on borrowed time. The bottom line however is drawn in today's gospel. Jesus turns to Peter and says, "You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church." Whether Jesus' idea of 'Church' is our idea of 'Church' is debateable, but one thing is for sure, Jesus intended to leave behind a group of followers initially led by Peter, united in their belief of Jesus and God until the end of time.

Because Peter recognised that God was acting through Jesus, he was entrusted with the job of leading the rest of us. The Church today is a testimony to Peter's faith, it exists because Peter and others like him trusted and believed in God. It exists because Peter and people like Peter acted out their faith despite hostilities and persecution. Fortunately today's Christians don't get chucked to the lions any more, but we face different sorts of problems instead. Today we face lethargy, conflicting secular values, and the complexities of scientific debate. The Church cannot be silenced. Christians are still needed to challenge injustice and greed. Fearless Christians like Peter and Paul are still needed to carry the baton.

As many of you will know, the Government has given permission for the limited reopening of churches for the public celebration of Mass starting from Saturday 4th July.

However, as your parish priest, I wish to stress that I must only move on safely and surely at the pace I feel is right for St. Joseph's and Holy Family.

The Sunday and Holy Day obligation to attend Mass is still dispensed during this national emergency as many people are still unable / feel unable to mix with other people. We have not yet returned to a state any where near 'normal'.

The Church is expecting more guidance from the Government. A number of ideas have been put forward for the celebration of Mass, one being an outside Mass. However, I feel we have to consider all the vagaries of a British summer – bring sun hat, sun cream, umbrellas, sunglasses, water, wellies, raincoats, etc. etc.

Once we begin public celebration of Sunday Mass, I will be celebrating more than one Mass to give more people the opportunity to attend. However, the normal schedule for Masses may not be back for some time. We will need a large number of stewards to sanitise all the seating in between Masses.

Please remember me in your prayers as I plan the next steps out of 'Lockdown', always keeping safe. I thank you for your prayers and understanding in this most difficult and stressful situation.

FIRST MARTYRS OF THE CHURCH OF ROME

Tuesday 30th June

The people we honour today had one thing in common: they gave up their lives for Christ. They were martyred because they were followers of the Lord Jesus. By the year 64, Emperor Nero's human rights violations had reached proportions beyond description. When a fire broke out in Rome on July 16, it was commonly believed that the emperor himself was responsible. As two-thirds of Rome lay in ruin, resentment grew. Nero became fearful. He needed a scapegoat and blamed the fire on the Christians.

Tacitus, a well-known historian, recorded that the Christians suffered cruel deaths. Some were fed to wild beasts. Others were tied to posts and became human torches that lit the Roman streets. The exact number of heroes is not known, but their gift of witness and their lives made a lasting impact on the people. Nero's was the first persecution by a Roman emperor, but not the last. And the more the Church was persecuted, the more it grew. The martyrs had paid the price so that all who would come after them could have the opportunity to embrace the faith.
