## FAITH, TRUST AND INTUITION

The story of the empty tomb should be the best part of the Bible, but instead there feels as though there's a great big chunk missing .... the bit where Jesus actually rises up from the dead. For many of us this presents no problem. Jesus said he would rise on the third day and that is exactly what happened. Everything happened just as Jesus said it would. But for some of us, the lack of detail leaves too many unanswered questions, and where there are unanswered questions there's room for doubt. One thing is for sure, we cannot start playing 'detective' with a mystery trail that has had two thousand years to go cold, so what are we supposed to do?

First of all we have to develop a toolbox of faith, trust, and intuition. Christians are accused of propping up impossible and improvable theories with blind faith. If this were true the accusers would have a point, but true faith runs deeper than this. We all use faith in every walk of life and we all need trust. People of faith are people who can push boundaries and take brave steps into the unknown. People of trust recognise possibilities in others and in themselves. People of intuition recognise integrity and truth. Anais Nin said, "We don't see things as they are, we see things as we are." "What you believe sets a course for your future and directs your daily activities. Consequently, when you believe only what you can see, a whole world of possibility is lost.

Easter isn't just an event that happened two thousand years ago. Easter is on any day we discover our trust in God. Easter is on any day we find that we are able to live boldly and well in the belief that death is not just a meaningless end to life.

## THE PASCHAL CANDLE - THE PILLAR OF FIRE

What is this great paschal candle that stands in our midst, which during the Fifty Days of Easter seems always to be burning, and never to go out? It is the pillar of fire by which God led the children of Israel from slavery to freedom, through the dusty desert to the land flowing with milk and honey. Behind it, we marched freed from sin from the gloom of exile back into our church's house on Easter's eve.

With it, we led those chosen for the sacraments of new life to the font of baptism that is both tomb and womb.

It is the holy sign of Christ our Light. (Thanks be to God!)

On it, we traced the sign of Christ yesterday and today, the beginning and the end, the alpha and omega.

Into it, we pressed five jewels that are the wounds of divine hands and feet and side.

For it, we same our some of consecration and praise:

For it, we sang our song of consecration and praise: "Accept, O God, this Easter candle. Let it shine with the lights of heaven and bravely burn forever!"

From it, we take our own light, a flame divided but undimmed. All who are baptized walk in its glow.

For fifty days it shines gloriously in the assembly of the church. Then, held in a place of honour near the font, it is brought out and lit for every evening sacrifice of praise, for every baptism and every funeral, every birth and every birth unto eternal life. And as the days and seasons turn, slowly this pillar of finest wax and strongest wick is consumed, burned down, eaten up by fire, sacrificed – like Christ himself – and never truly extinguished. And, so it measures our days and seasons until it is Easter again, until once more we sing in the light of a new paschal candle:

"May the Morning Star which never sets

find this flame still burning: Christ the Morning Star, who came back from the dead and shed His peaceful light on all people." Thanks be to God!
