Martha or Mary

Jesus has come to visit. Martha is in the kitchen preparing the meal. Mary is sitting listening to Jesus and not doing anything to help her sister. Martha suddenly loses her rag! This isn't fair, Mary should be helping her. Then Jesus surprises us. He tells Martha not to worry about things that don't really matter. "Mary," he tells her "has chosen the better part."

It's a parable that gets us all hot and bothered, but that's what makes it such a clever story. Jesus takes a very common domestic occurrence and turns it into a lesson. It's a lesson we will all identify with, argue over, discuss, and then hopefully take something from. That Jesus takes Mary's side is surprising, since most of us, especially women, will take Martha's' side. This of course is where we all fall down in or appreciation of the lesson. We spend a lot of time deciding whose side we should be on, when it really isn't about taking sides. Perhaps we could argue that both women had got things a bit wrong. Perhaps both should have sat and listened and both helped serve up the meal, but the story is not about the logistics of organising a dinner party.

Jesus' point is about finding a balance between listening and taking action. Martha is a symbol of our modern world ... too busy to listen; too busy to stop and think. However, if Martha hadn't have busied herself in the kitchen, Jesus would not have eaten that night. Jesus clearly isn't condemning Martha for her action, but is pointing out that

the better part is action based on listening and forethought.

The gospel today teaches us that listening and understanding is the prerequisite for discipleship. The real danger in our busy lives is that we simply run round like headless chickens doing the same jobs day in and day out, without éver developing spiritually. We are being asked to slow down a little, to stop and think and listen.

At the end of the day this story isn't about whether we champion Mary or Martha, but that we adopt a little of Mary and a little of Martha. Action is nothing without thought, and thought is nothing without action.

See, I have God for my help. The Lord sustains my soul. I will sacrifice to you with willing heart, and praise your Entrance Antiphon:

name, O Lord, for it is good.

ST MARY MAGDALENE – 22nd July

Mary of Magdala is perhaps the most maligned and poorly understood figure in early Christianity. The whole story of Mary as a prostitute, who is fallen and redeemed, is a very powerful image of redemption. Powerful as this image may be, it is not the story of Mary Magdalene. Mary Magdalene is mentioned in each of the four gospels in the New Testament, but not once does it mention that she was a prostitute or a sinner. At some point Mary Magdalene became confused with two other women in the Bible: Mary, the sister of Martha and the unnamed sinner from Luke's Gospel (7:36-50) In 1969 the Catholic Church declared that Mary Magdalene was not the penitent sinner of Luke's Gospel but the reputation still lingers.
