What's The Point?

Today we recall the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem and we hear again the story of the Passion. But as we stand in church waving our palms and reading our Mass books, we have to be aware that we are doing more than just rereading a two thousand year old story. What point is there in simply remembering a sequence of events? There is only a point in remembering Jesus' Passion if it truly impacts on our twenty first century lives.

We don't need to have been around at the time to imagine how it must have felt to be a part of the crowd that greeted Jesus as he rode into Jerusalem. We know what it's like to be swept along with a crowd. We know how we can be brave as part of a crowd... infallible even. We remember the crowd that supported Jesus so enthusiastically at the beginning of the week and how it mysteriously melted away by the end, to be replaced by a different crowd shouting for his crucifixion. Are we any better than those original supporters? Can we stand up for Jesus as individuals when the going gets tough?

We remember Jesus' journey from Palm Sunday to Good Friday. We remember that it's a journey he made with no hint of compromise. How easy it would have been for Jesus to have bypassed Jerusalem altogether, but what would have been the point of that for us two thousand years on.

There is no room in Christianity for compromise.

We remember the death of Jesus as a supreme act of love. Jesus taught that we were worth all that pain and suffering. Do we leave the church today simply to catch up with our Facebook accounts and enjoy our Sunday lunch, or do we consider how we should live our lives from this day on knowing that Jesus considered us worth his ultimate sacrifice?

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HOLY TRIDUUM

Holy Thursday, Good Friday, the Easter Vigil.

The Easter Triduum, marking the days of Jesus' Passion and Resurrection, is the most important time of the Church's year. It begins with the evening Mass of Holy Thursday, reaches its high point in the Easter Vigil and closes on Easter Sunday evening.

The term Triduum means 'three days.' The three days are counted as the Hebrews counted their days, from dusk to dusk. Therefore, the three days of the Easter Triduum are from dusk on Holy Thursday to dusk on Good Friday (day one), dusk on Good Friday to dusk on Holy Saturday (day two), and dusk on Holy Saturday to dusk on Easter Sunday (day three). Each of those days 'tells' a different part of the story of Jesus' saving action. We look at the East Triduum as on single celebration that lasts for three days. We cannot

separate the death of Jesus from his resurrection. We do not spend all of the three days in church, but at various times during those days, we are called to church to gather and remember together. Because the Triduum tells an ongoing story, try if you can to make all the services.

MAUNDAY THURSDAY

The Mass will speak of Jesus wanting to celebrate the PASSOVER MEAL with his friends. He transforms the Passover Meal into the giving of himself to his father as the Paschal Lamb. Jesus invites us all to this banquet. He gives us his very self BODY AND BLOOD and offers us signs of how we are to love one another. In the washing of the feet, Jesus reminds us that we are all called to serve. We shall witness some of our brothers and sisters of the Parish having their feet washed. Our Ministers of Communion will renew their promises to serve our sick, the housebound and each of us in their offering of Jesus in the Eucharist.

At Mass, we consecrate sufficient hosts to enable us to receive Holy Communion on Good Friday. At the conclusion of the Mass of the Lord's Supper, the sacred hosts are carried in solemn procession to our Altar of Repose. Watching begins and continues until Midnight. We encourage one another to watch with Jesus, mindful of his agony in the garden.

"Could you not watch one hour with me" The Church will stay open until midnight.

GOOD FRIDAY

We celebrate the Lord's Passion and Death.
The Church keeps this day in a most special way.
The service is divided into four parts:
The Word of God - Prayers of the Faithful Veneration of the Cross - Holy Communion.

It is not Mass, rather it is a service recommending that we be filled with gratitude for this Perfect Act of Love for us on Calvary. On Good Friday evening we follow the Stations of the Cross, commencing at 7.00pm.

EASTER VIGIL AND EASTER SUNDAY MASSES

The Holiest day of the year, one filled with joy and celebration as we proclaim *Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again.*

The services during Holy Week tell a continuous story so try, if you can, to attend them all.

The garden Crucifix, dedicated to the Holy Souls, was blessed on Good Friday 2012.

It is a wonderful place of sanctuary and prayer for many people.
