Words of Wisdom

We readily accept words of wisdom if we hear them from the pulpit, from Radio Four's Moral Maze or from a learned lecturer in theology. We are less likely to accept words of wisdom if we hear them from a TV soap, the man in the corner shop, or from our own children. We need to trust our source of information before we trust the information itself. At the end of the day, in our eyes some people are qualified to dish out words of wisdom and others are not. The danger of this outlook is that we can end up believing absolutely everything from the mouth of someone highly qualified, and nothing from the mouths of those who haven't a qualification to their name. This is sad, because anyone can have an insight to share, and by closing our minds we do not hear the wisdom and an opportunity is lost.

When Jesus returned to his hometown to preach, he was treated with similar disregard. When the Nazarenes heard him speaking they could not take him seriously because they could remember all too well

his humble origins. Wasn't he just a carpenter ... Mary's son? They closed their minds against Jesus, and because their minds were closed, Jesus could not work any great deed that day.

Of course, there is more to this story than Jesus being rejected in his hometown. This is a story about how we too can ignore or reject God. This is a story about the stumbling blocks we encounter in our faith. Perhaps our pet stumbling block might be our unwillingness to listen to others in the belief that we know best. Our stumbling block might be a reluctance to ask for help, fearing that this might be a sign of weakness. Our stumbling block might be the inability to recognise the voice of God in our day-to-day surroundings. Could God be talking to us through a partner, through our children, parents or friends?

FIRST HOLY COMMUNION

We congratulate the six children and their families from the parish who celebrate their First Holy Communion at 11.00am Mass. The first three available benches on each side will be reserved for the FHC families. This will mean this Mass will be especially busy.

Next Sunday at 2.00pm we, hopefully, will celebrate the First Holy Communion Mass for the second class at St. Joseph's school who, unfortunately, had to postpone their Mass last Saturday.

COVID 19

The Bishops of England and Wales have recently issued revised guidelines as we come out of Lockdown. Holy Communion continues to be recommended on the hand. However, outside of localities suffering high spikes of infections (which Greater Manchester is) those wishing to receive on the tongue are now recommended to wait until the end of the distribution of Holy Communion and receive on the tongue with the priest or deacon sanitising their hand after each communicant.

At St. Joseph's and Holy Family, Father Stephen is assessing the infection rate daily. At present, if you wish to receive Communion on the tongue you will be invited to come forward at the end of the distribution of Holy Communion. The priest or deacon will sanitise their hands before and after giving Holy Communion to each person.

As you receive Holy Communion those who distribute Holy Communion will say in a clear voice 'The Body of Christ'. You are now able to respond in an audible and clear way 'Amen'. Also, please remember to consume the host as soon as you receive it. You are not to walk away with the host. Thank you.
